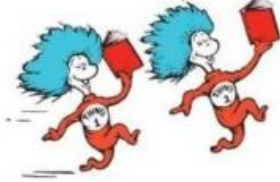

Today we are going to be revisiting suffixes. Suffixes are added to the end of a root word. Today you will be adding suffixes to nouns to create adjectives and verbs.

Suffixes

Converting nouns or adjectives into verbs using suffixes.

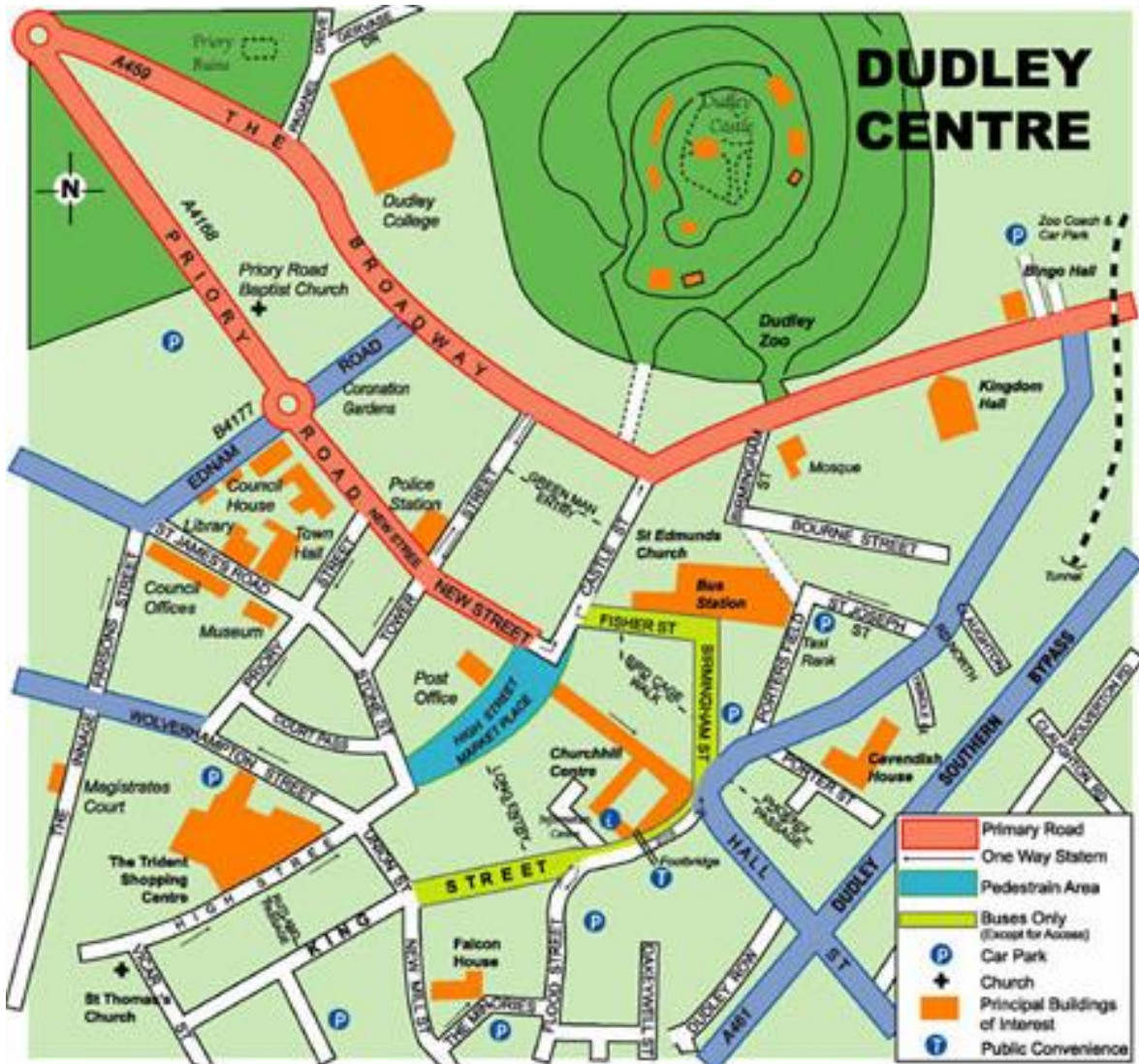
Now write three sentences using both the noun and adjective/verb from the tables above. For example, the shelf was not straight, she would have to straighten it.
